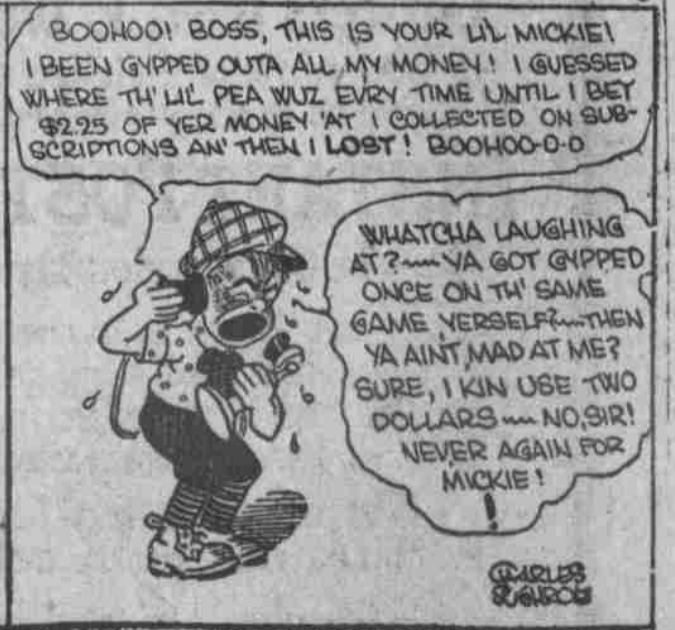
Pleased With Outlook
