4. May be proven by filing parole or discharge, or in case these have been lost or destroyed, by officers or comrades who know the facts.
5. May be proven by comrades and citizens.

the United States and the Confederate States, do hereby apply for aid under the act of the General Assembly of Tennessee,
entitled "An act for the benefit of the indigent and disabled soldiers of the late war between the States, and to fix the fees of
attorneys or agents for procuring such pensions, and fixing a penalty for the violation of the same." and I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Company B 3rd Tennessee Cavalry

in the service of the Confederate or United States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not hold any National, State, or County office, nor do I receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldiers' home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I have known Jim Rice for nearly forty years, and it affords
me pleasure to recommend him to the favorable consideration of the
Pension Board of Tennessee. For uprightness of character, no man
in this County stands higher. He is a plain, simple, kind-hearted
man, holding respect of everybody within his acquaintances.

His term of service in the Confederate army was brief, last-
ing only about eighteen months. He was badly ruptured while in
service consequence of which he did not re-inlist after the first
twelve months, but really served without re-inlistment six months
over that time. He came home and was never able to do service af-
terwards, nor for that matter, has he ever been able to perform
any manual labor that required any sort of physical exertion up
to the present time.

The above facts, I have obtained from time to time by inqui-
ries among his old comrades and his neighbors of to-day. In my
judgment he is as much entitled to a pension, under the laws of
Tennessee as any man now upon your rolls.

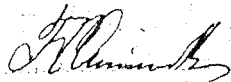
