Mrs. Jordan, who was 27, had been living in Los Alamos for the past two years. She was a member of the Oak Grove Baptist Church. Northside Ga Close Victory On Friday Night

The Huntingdon High Mustangs closed out gridiron season last Friday when they lost a close to the Northside Indians by a score of 25-19.
The victory for the Indians in the Volunteer playoff against Camden on Thursday night of the Lexington.

Faced by Jimmy Smothers' Mustang back, the Indians fought back from a deficit to take a lead over 19-18 early in the final quarter.
Proving himself as the highest scoring ace in the game, Smothers piled it around the stout Indians 167 yards in 23 attempts for a 7.3 average. Except for collar bone he suffered in the third period, the Indians have been denied a conference championship. The game left a season total of 89 points.
Huntingdon outgained the on the ground 327 yards, the Indians made 85 none for the Mustangs. Smothers amassed 18 first downs compared to 20 for the Mustangs.
The Indians garnered 100 yards on five pass completions, nine attempted, as the defense against the offense was short of superior.
