WRITES FROM ENGLAND

In a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Clark, Buena Vista, Pvt. Wm. B. Clark, tells his folk to support the Red Cross, as it was doing a wonderful job. His letter follows:

“England—Dec. 24

“Dear Mother and Dad:—This is the day before Christmas and I hope you are as well as I am. I am planning on a nice dinner tomorrow and I hope you enjoy yours as well as I do mine. We are having turkey. I think most of the boys in the service are. We have practically the same things here we had over there.

“Even though this is a nice country and things are in the same order, it doesn't compare with the States. We Americans have something to be thankful for.

“I never heard Pop discuss the American Red Cross of the other War, but don't let anybody tell you it is bad now, because you can never realize the value of it. It is a very active organization here and you don't seem at all to be in a strange place. It doesn't seem a bit farther home here than back in the State. Love to all. Bernice.
