Soldier's Application for Pension

Under the Class "5."

I, August Friend, a native of the State of Switzerland
and now a citizen of Tennessee, resident at Nashville
607 Monroe Street in the County of Davidson
in said State of Tennessee, and who was a soldier from the State of Tennessee, in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States, do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of Tennessee,
entitled "An Act for the benefit of the indigent and disabled soldiers of the late war between the States, and to fix the fees
of attorneys or agents for procuring such pensions, and fixing a penalty for the violation of the same." And I do solemnly
swear that I was a member of First Tennessee Regiment Company K.

In the service of the Confederate or United States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive
the benefits of this Act. I further swear that I do not hold any National, State, or County office, nor do I receive aid or
pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldiers' home, and that I am
unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the
following questions are true:

When did you enlist and in what command? Give the names of the regimental and company officers under whom
you served.

Answer May 1861 in Maney's Regiment Company K.

In what battle or battles were you engaged, and, if not wounded, state what disabilities did you receive, if any?

Answer Shot in left leg near Chattanooga was not in
any regular engagement but was on the Skirmish
line, and doing service in the butcher pen.

What was the precise nature of your wound or disability, if any?

Answer was struck on left calf of leg with a piece of
shell and disabled two weeks.

Were you incapacitated for service by reason of said wound or disability incurred.

Answer yes two weeks

Were you discharged from the army by reason of said wound or disability?

Answer no

If discharged from the army, where were you and what did you do until the close of the war?

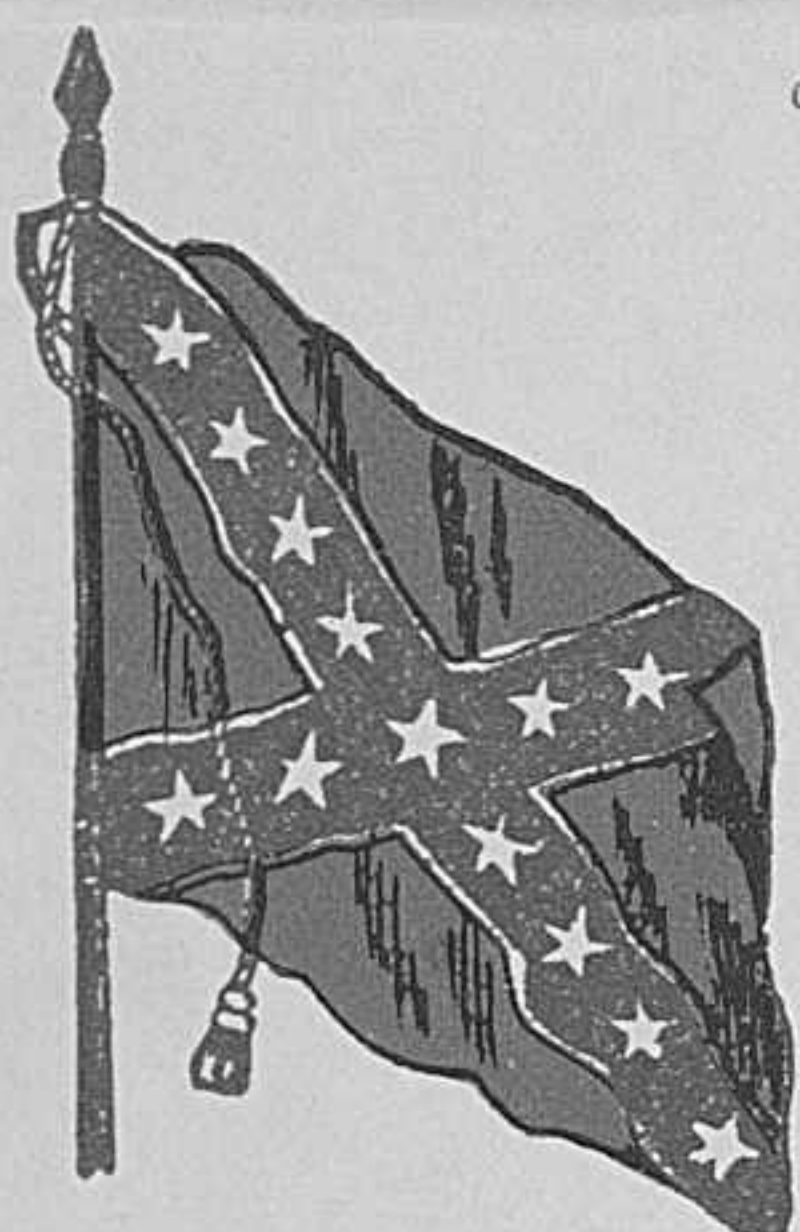

The name August Friend has not been found on the rolls, on file in this Department, of Company K, 1st (Maney's) Tennessee Infantry, Confederate States Army.

The records show, however, that one August Freund, private, (company not stated), 1st Tennessee Infantry, Confederate States Army, received on June 21, 1863, at Shelbyville, pay for service from June 30, 1862, to January 1, 1863.

The Union records of prisoners of war show that one August Freund, private (company not stated), same regiment, who resided in Davidson County, Tennessee, was 5 feet 7 inches in height, and who had grey eyes, light hair and fair complexion, was released (date or place of capture or surrender not stated) January 3, 1864, at Nashville, Tennessee, upon taking the oath of allegiance.

No further record of either man has been found.
