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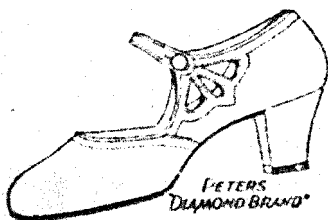

FIND NEW PELLAGRA CURE

Development of a new and cheaper weapon for the fight against pellagra was reported by the South Carolina Food Research Commission recently.

The new weapon is a concentrate made from cottonseed meal, a very cheap foodstuff now used in rations for farm animals.

The discovery was disclosed by Dr. Harold Levine in a paper read before the South Carolina Academy of Science at Columbia, S. C. He pointed out that pellagra occurs chiefly among the very poor, many of whom are unable to purchase the foods known to contain the anti-pellagra vitamin.

Dr. Levine said that the research had also disclosed that "a certain edible variety of soybean" contains the anti-pellagra factor in abundance.
